We need your garden looking its best for the Festival and Parade of Gardens. Plot inspections will occur before August 15; gardens should be weeded and looking neat, paths mowed and free of debris. Gardens are very weedy with purslane; please remove it. 46th Avenue gardeners should make sure sidewalk is well-weeded and swept of debris.

PLANT PROFILE

Tatsoi Grow this easy salad vegetable in spring or fall. Rosettes of spoon-shaped leaves are tender, stems are crunchy; delicious taste is similar to watercress. Grow under row cover for blemish-

free leaves. You can eat thinnings in 21 days, full-sized plants in 45. Tatsoi held well in this summer's early heat, and is also very cold-hardy.

Don't Let Your EXTRA VEGETABLES Go to Waste!

Weekly food delivery to area food shelves is off to a good start. Deliveries generally occur 3 times per week; the schedule is posted on the shed bulletin board. Please pick your garden regularly and put produce you can't use in the cooler on pickup days. The food shelf is in need of fresh produce, and grateful for our contributions.

HOW IT WORKS A cooler is located on the west side of the shed, under the pine trees. Please place your produce here before 9 am on pick-up day. Drop off vegetables the evening before or the early morning of collection day, to avoid produce being damaged by daytime heat. Place leafy greens and herbs in the pails provided, with water in the bottom of the container to keep them fresh. Garden volunteers deliver your vegetables to the food shelves. Please let us know if you observe other people taking vegetables from the coolers.

Be ALERT and Be SAFE

There have been many thefts of plants and produce from gardens in the past months. The Longfellow Garden at Minnehaha Park had hundreds of plants stolen. Dowling has already experienced thefts of fruit, vegetables and flowers.

Please keep an eye on your area of the garden. Get to know others who garden nearby, and be alert for persons who engage in suspicious behavior. Bring a cell phone to the garden and call if you witness criminal behavior; take a photo of the person(s) if possible. If you observe someone stealing from gardens, ask them to leave immediately. Be alert when walking to and from the garden.

REPORT THEFTS, VANDALISM AND OTHER IMPROPER

BEHAVIOR If you see anything suspicious, take note of the time and date, appearance and age of persons, and the vehicle they are driving. If possible, get the license plate number. Call 911, or for non-emergencies, 311. Give this address for the garden: 3901 46th Avenue South (note this is a new address for the garden; always use this address). Call the Dowling voice mail, 651/255-6607, to report what you witnessed and the steps you have taken. Alert others in the garden.

DETAILS, Details, Details...

DON'T LEAVE ANY MATERIALS BY THE SHED! Remove trash and used garden materials to your home garbage can. Weeds and other garden debris go to the compost pile east of the apple trees. Reusable garden items may be offered on spring and fall clean-up days only. Inconsiderate gardeners have been dumping lots of garden debris next to the shed; please stop.

RESPECT OUR TOOLS AND EACH OTHER! Tools are being broken by misuse, and community-owned tools are disappearing. Put away all tools and watering equipment when you are finished. Place them neatly in the shed, in the spots where they belong. Coil hoses and hang so they don't drape on the ground. *Lock the shed!* Treat tools gently and only use them for the purpose they were intended. Look for any community tools left out in the garden area and put them away.

KIDS IN THE GARDEN Please instruct your children in the proper use of tools and watering equipment, and supervise them when in the garden.

ROCKS We no longer have an area to place unwanted rocks. All rocks must remain within the confines of your plot (do not place in path or anywhere else in garden area) or you will be cited.

PLOT INSPECTIONS Gardens will be inspected periodically for rules violations like tall weeds and obstructed paths. Expect a sweep before Heirloom Festival; other inspections will occur randomly. Avoid a citation by keeping weeds under control (*purslane too!*) and pathways mowed and free of plants and rocks.

Plight of the BUMBLEBEE

Over 20,000 bee species pollinate more than 90 of the world's plants, fruits and vegetables, and they are disappearing at an alarming rate. Without them, we will be dependent on the wind and other insects to pollinate our food. If the rapid decline of honeybees continues, common fruits and vegetables (like potatoes, apples, almonds, carrots, beans, citrus fruits, broccoli) and honey will no longer be available to most Americans.

This sudden disappearance is called Colony Collapse Disorder (CCD). The hive or colony is abandoned by worker bees, after

which honey-raiding pests cause the death of the Queen and remaining bees.

Several trends seem to be implicated in the disappearance of billions of bees worldwide (*a billion bees* = 15,000 beehives). Genetically modified plants which secrete toxins to kill insects may turn up in the pollen and kill bees. Pesticides called neonicotinoids may interfere with a bee's navigation, causing them to become disoriented and unable to find nectar or their way back to the hive. An insecticide called Imidacloprid used in the soil finds its way to the plant's tissues, killing bees in the same manner as genetically modified plants.

Beekeepers, food producers, governments world-wide and scientists are working to stem the incidence of CCD. For more information, and what you can do:
