Welcome Back to the Dowling Community Garden!

We want to welcome back returning gardeners and extend a warm welcome to new gardeners. We hope everyone has a successful gardening season!

Your Commitment to COMMUNITY Gardening

Dowling Garden is a community effort and depends on everyone's participation to be successful. Please give serious consideration to the level of your involvement in the activities that keep Dowling going.

Dowling is a large community garden – about 160 plots – and a great deal of effort goes into making the garden run each season. There is much work to be performed throughout the season, yet only a few hours of time is required from each gardener. We need each and every one of you to follow through on your commitments to volunteer your time and talents. It takes all of us to make Dowling an attractive, productive and safe place to garden.

The garden is run by volunteers (a Garden Manager and the Garden Planning Committee) who meet on the third Tuesday every month. We invite you to join the Committee; please contact Garden Manager Joan Krey at 651/255-6607 if you have questions or would like more information. If you have an issue you'd like to bring to the committee's attention, please call two weeks before the upcoming meeting to be placed on the agenda.

GARDEN RENT is Due March 20th!

To keep your garden plot this year, please send \$____ and the signed agreement form on page 3 by March 20, 2002. If your money is not received by this date, you forfeit your plot and it will be given to someone on the waiting list.

Please call or write immediately if you don't want a garden space this year; there is a waiting list of eager gardeners. Make your check payable to **Dowling** Community Garden.

Increase in Garden Plot RENTAL FEES

It's been necessary to raise garden plot rental fees to cover higher administrative costs. Water quality testing, phone service, PO box rental, website hosting, as well as garden improvements added to our expenses last year. Garden rental fees in the Twin Cities average \$15-20; Dowling Community Garden is still a very good value.

Spring 2002 Planting Date: JUNE 2

→ Your garden must be planted by Sunday, June 2 Let us know if you do not want your garden space. Unplanted plots will be assumed to be abandoned and will be given to a person on the waiting list.

About FENCES....

The school has requested that nothing be grown on the perimeter fence, and that we maintain a 12" buffer space between garden plants and the fenceline. This includes plants that grow up to or through the fence. This rule will be strictly enforced! Use landscape fabric and/or woodchips to control weeds. 46th Avenue gardeners are also responsible for keeping the area outside of the fence, up to the sidewalk, free from weeds.

...and PATHWAYS

Please help maintain the pathway next to your garden, so gardeners can easily pass by. Keep rocks, weeds and garden debris out of this area; make sure garden plants remain in your plot; mow grass or put in wood chips; and make sure the pathway is accessible for carts and lawn mowers.

Garden Clean-up Day is May 4, 10 AM - Noon

Come meet your gardening neighbors and help prepare the common garden areas for a new season. We will clean up

debris, get out the water barrels, repair the shed, remove graffiti and complete other seasonal chores.

Bring garden tools (rakes, wheelbarrows, shovels, pruners), weed trimmers, lawn mowers, trash bags, scrub brushes to clean graffiti, garden gloves.

This is a great opportunity to fulfill your volunteer requirement, get to know other gardeners, have fun!

DOWLING COMMUNITY GARDEN RULES

In the spirit of community and to clarify everyone's part in this Garden, these basic rules have been developed by the Garden Planning Committee. Some of these rules have been requested by the school, others are Minneapolis ordinance or Minnesota law; some exist to ensure that we fulfill our obligations to neighboring residents and other gardeners at Dowling. When you rent a plot, you agree to follow these rules and actively participate in garden activities. Gardeners who violate these rules will be contacted and may forfeit their garden plot if problems are not resolved.

- **1. Pay the rent** for your plot by the time designated in the spring newsletter.
- **2. Plant your plot** by the time designated. Unplanted plots will be assumed abandoned and forfeited.
- 3. Clean up your garden plot at the end of the season.
- **4.** Each gardener is required to **volunteer** their time for the garden (see list of volunteer opportunities on page 3).
- **5. Your plot is not transferable.** You may not permanently give your plot to another person. A one-season temporary transfer is possible, however. If you seasonally sublet your plot to someone else, let Garden Manager Joan Krey know.
- **6. Weeds:** Weeds that spread into neighboring plots can become a source of tension and frustration among gardeners. Weeds must not be allowed to become taller than 8 inches according to City Code. If your weeds get out of control, consider hiring someone to cut them down.
- **7. No trees are allowed** in garden plots; if any grow up, please cut them down.
- **8. Paths:** You are responsible for half of the path next to your plot. Paths must be kept clear of weeds, rocks, garden plants, and be level so that a cart or person can pass through. There is a community garden push lawn mower in the shed you may use. Please do not use carpeting, roofing materials or other non-organic materials on common pathways.
- **9. Rocks:** If removing rocks from your garden, do not place on paths or grassy areas; place within the confined rock area on school lawn (near path at east end of garden). Do not place rocks on the school compost pile!
- 10. Compost: There is a large compost area on the east side of the orchard along the fence. Keep sticks separate from other plant debris. Use this area or compost on your plot; compost piles must appear neat. Do not place garden debris anywhere else on the property, especially garden pathways and common areas. Do not place non-compostable items or trash in school compost area.
- 11. *note rule change*: **Fences** surrounding the Garden are school property and must not be tampered with. Do not grow plants on or through the perimeter fence! Per school requirement, we must maintain a 1' buffer between garden plants and the fence. Use landscape fabric and/or woodchips to create a buffer area. 46th Avenue plotholders are responsible for keeping the fence area clear of plants/weeds outside the fence up to the sidewalk.

- **12.** In order to make the garden more attractive for neighboring residents, please keep **bags of leaves** on your plot, not next to the main fences or in the paths. Bags must be kept neat some neighbors have complained. Use wood or white fencing; no orange plastic snow fences, please.
- 13. *new rule*: MN state law prohibits the **use of pesticides** and **herbicides** on school property (*visit the Dowling website www.DowlingCommunityGarden.org for more information*).
- **14. Respect the school property.** Don't dump anything in the woods, and do not bring motorized vehicles on school property.
- **15. Do not pick fruit or vegetables** from another plot unless you have been given permission. Many gardeners will happily share their excess produce if asked.
- **16.** Gardeners are responsible for giving the Garden Manager any **change of address** or telephone.
- 17. Pets: Keep your pets out of other gardens; clean up after your pets on school property.

Procedure for Rules Violations

The Garden Planning Committee has established these procedures when Garden rules have been violated:

First rule violation: The Garden Planning Committee phones the gardener to explain the problem. The gardener has one week to resolve the problem.

If the problem has not been taken care of at the end of the week, the Committee sends the gardener a letter. This letter will re-state the problem and give the gardener one additional week to resolve the problem. It will also let the gardener know that if the problem is not corrected, the plot will be forfeited.

If the problem is still unresolved one week after the gardener receives the letter, the gardener receives written notice that the plot has been forfeited and the rental fee will not be refunded.

For a *second rule violation* (within a two year period), the gardener will receive a letter and have one week to resolve the problem. The gardener will be considered on probation; an additional violation means plot forfeiture.

For a *third rule violation* (within a two year period), the gardener will receive a letter stating the plot has been forfeited and the rental fee will not be returned.

Helping Your Garden Grow: VOLUNTEER OPPORTUNITIES

In order to build that community and share responsibilities fairly, the Garden Planning Committee requires each gardener to commit to one or more of the following responsibilities each season.

This is a chance for you to meet other gardeners and help your community garden grow! Please read through this list of activities and select those that fit your personality, interests and schedule. Fill in your choice(s) on the Agreement Form below.

Volunteer Coordinators

Help organize and monitor volunteer activities

Garden Planning Committee

Meet monthly (on the third Tuesday, 7-9 PM) to oversee all garden activities, plan for future projects, make and enforce garden rules

Water

Work with the Water Coordinator as part of a team to keep water barrels filled. We are especially in need of an Assistant to help the Water Coordinator, as well as volunteers to fill water barrels (weekday and weekend volunteers are needed)

Phoning

Help spread the word about announcements, clean-ups, special activities

Shed Maintenance

Clean up tools, repair shed or gutters, weed around shed

Weed Monitoring

Check plots for overgrown weeds, phone gardeners to discuss weed problem, follow-up monitoring

Spring & Fall Clean-up Days/Ongoing Debris Clean-up Pick up litter, perform seasonal chores (weeding, raking, hauling debris, water barrels) and maintenance as needed

Landscaping/Construction for Special Projects

Path preparation, garden bed preparation and planting, improvements construction, etc.

Hauling/Delivery

Pick up tools and equipment, get wood chips or compost, run other errands

Fence Repair and Maintenance

Arrange for repairs to fence, remove weeds or overgrown plants along sidewalk

Pathway and Garden Plot Borders Maintenance

Re-stake pathways and garden plots, clear paths of weeds and garden materials, mow paths

Flower Garden Weeding/Maintenance

Resource Person for Gardening Questions

Answer other gardeners' questions or provide referrals

Potluck Dinner Organizer

Arrange for location, materials

Newsletter and Website Contributors

Write articles, provide resource materials, supply photos or artwork
